WELCOME FATHER JOE!

Right after Fr. Joseph Baker arrived in Pontiac and offered his first weekend of Masses in mid June, he took off on a much needed vacation with fellow priests that was planned before he arrived. Then in July, he

spent a week at the Sacre Coeur Retreat Center for the mandatory Diocesan Young Clergy retreat. Fr. Joe is just now starting to settle into our parish and is enjoying meeting parishioners and getting to know our parish better through various meetings with leadership groups.

Fr. Joe was born in Peoria and grew up in Morton. He graduated from the University of Illinois with a degree in Economics & Psychology. While at the UofI, he was deeply involved with the campus Newman Center and Opus Dei which helped him discern his calling to the priesthood, and lead him to Mount St. Mary's Seminary in Emmitsburg, Maryland. He was ordained a priest of the Diocese of Peoria on May 23, 2015.

Since ordination, Fr. Joe has served as a parochial vicar (assistant pastor) in Champaign, Urbana, Bloomington and Normal and has also served as a chaplain at Central Catholic in Bloomington and Alleman High School in Rock Island. He arrives in Pontiac after most recently serving as pastor at St. Ambrose in Milan and St. Patrick in Andalusia. Fr. Joe is also the Episcopal Vicar for Consecrated Virgins in our diocese.

Spending time with the kids at Totus Tuus in late June and working at the 4-H Fair kitchen has helped Fr. Joe meet many parishioners, young and old, and he is anxious for school to start and looks forward to spending time in the classrooms and at some extra curricular events, in addition to meeting other parishioners and participating in committees, bible studies and other groups in the parish.

We welcome Fr. Joe and pray that God will bless him with many grace-filled years here at St. Mary's.

FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



In the six weeks since I moved here to Pontiac there have been many changes and challenges I've faced. Foremost is simply the reality of having to move from one parish to another. We see Jesus using the example of plants regularly in the Gospel, and I think the image of being uprooted is particularly apropos for my situation.

When a plant is firmly set in its soil, well watered and cared

for, with a strong root system, it can be very stressful and even threatening to the plant's future viability if it is simply pulled out of its soil. We know, though, that such an *uprooted plant, when re-potted in fertile ground, will in time set down new roots, continue to grow, and given the right conditions, may even flourish and advance beyond the level it had achieved in its prior environment.*

In my first article in this bi-monthly newsletter as the pastor at St. Mary's I wanted to share this image with you because it's something I think describes a bit of my personal feelings and emotions in these days. I was very happy at my previous assignment in the Quad Cities where I was privileged to serve so many in the parishes and schools in that beautiful community on the Mississippi River. To be honest, I was so saddened to leave my former assignment and the many people I came to love there. When the bishop informed me of the move he desired for me, I felt as if he was uprooting me.

When any of us undergoes a significant move in our lives, the temptation is to constantly look back on one's previous situation, comparing and contrasting the current circumstances to what we knew prior. I've certainly done a decent amount of that, particularly in areas where I feel my previous parishes did a good job and where I've found it to be a bit more challenging here. When things in a new environment are challenging, it can be easy to focus on those realities and not acknowledge, with a spirit of gratitude, the positive attributes of the new environment.

So with this article, drawing on my experience as a priest at 6 previous schools (4 elementary and 2 secondary) as well as 6 prior parishes, not to mention the 9 additional parishes I was formally assigned to serve at as a seminarian and deacon in Illinois and Maryland, I'd like to draw your attention to a few of the items at which St. Mary's in Pontiac seems to excel, over and above that of the average parish.

First: I have been very impressed with the programs devoted to the Catholic education of our youth, particularly the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd (CGS) program. CGS is something I have familiarity with from the past. I feel so strongly about it being the best thing going in the realm of children's catechesis that I had actually initiated discussions about bringing it to one of my former parishes. So to come into an environment in which it is already present is a real highlight for me. I look forward to fostering the program and helping it grow even more! Second: Although school hasn't started just yet, I can tell from several conversations I've already had, St. Mary's School is an education environment centered around our Catholic faith. This isn't just highfalutin words, but it truly is the reality. From everyone in the school community with whom I've associated so far, it's clear the Catholicity of St. Mary's is very important. The school is known as the St. Mary's Saints not simply because we needed a mascot and logo, but in truth because people in our community want our children to be saints. I can tell the decisions made and the conversations had within the school are colored by that reality. Sadly, this isn't something that is found within every Catholic school community, but I can see that it is found here at St. Mary's in Pontiac. For that, I am very, very grateful.

Third: I have long felt the process of marriage preparation at most parishes, in which a couple simply meets with a priest 5 or 6 times prior to the wedding is insufficient. While I've enjoyed getting to know couples and sharing faith with them, it's been in my mind that we really need a system in which those preparing for marriage meet with other members of the parish and have an opportunity to sit down with one or two couples who have been married for many decades. Rather than just talking to a priest who's never been married, this would give future married couples an opportunity to interact with a devoted couple who know from personal experience what it is to be committed to the lifelong vocation of Holy Matrimony. I wanted to arrange such a system at my previous parish but various obstacles seemed to always get in the way of successfully getting it off the ground. Well, it is very exciting for me that here at St. Mary's, we have just such an arrangement! I know it has been and will continue to be beneficial to all those who approach Jesus in the Sacrament of Holy Matrimony.

Fourth: There is great devotion here at St. Mary's, and a significant number of people truly have a personal relationship with Jesus Christ. I was once assigned to a parish with over 1,000 families in a town of over 100,000 people that only averaged 15-20 people attending Daily Mass. St. Mary's is a slightly smaller parish, and Pontiac is obviously a much smaller community, yet we tend to have 50 or so people at Mass each morning! Although our adoration chapel has not been perpetual since covid, we still have adoration with scheduled adorers every day except Sunday. Of many other characteristics of our parish which I could share, this is the fourth and final positive attribute I'll mention in these pages. There are many people here who have an active spiritual life who are really striving to know the Lord Jesus, particularly through His sacraments. This is, no doubt, our parish's greatest strength.

So yes, I still feel a bit uprooted, but with each passing day I'm feeling more and more comfortable and at home. It's clear to me the bishop has re-potted me in fertile ground. In time, my roots will grow and expand in this new pot. I'm confident that together we will grow, and I pray that in time we will flourish into the saints God wants us to be.

Praise be Jesus Christ! Now and forever! Fr. Joe



From The Back Page

It's that time of year when things start to change. If you are a parent, you may be facing your child going to daycare, preschool, kindergarten, high school or college for the first time. These moments are exciting but also daunting. If you are past those years of child rearing, then maybe you are dealing with health issues, an ailing parent, a divorce, a new job, remarriage, anything really and these issues and everything that comes with them can be overwhelming.

This time of year I always think about the book, "The Kissing Hand" by Audrey Penn. This book was a lifesaver when my son was little and had fear about the unknown of all day kindergarten. The book is about a baby raccoon named Chester who is fearful to leave his mom and start school. He is afraid of the unknown, so the mom tells him she has a solution. She kisses his hand and tells him any time he is feeling scared or unsure to hold his hand to his heart and he won't be alone. I did this with my kids so many times through the years, and I believe it helped them because it reminded them that I was with them and loved them whether they could see me or not. As in the book, my kids would kiss the palm of my hand, so when I missed them, I could remember they were with me. It is quite simply about having faith that you are loved and not forgotten. A pretty simple concept but oh, so powerful.

I believe "The Kissing Hand" concept is useful in the above situations, especially for adults. We need to feel loved, heard, cared for, appreciated. We also know that the kissing hand is a children's book with a simple message. Your love and faith in someone doesn't go away when you aren't with them. This ties directly into our faith in Jesus. We can't see

him, but we know he is there. Some of us treat him as a silent partner. Some of us treat him as our best friend and confidant. Some of us fluctuate back and forth depending on how things are going in our lives. He is steadfast and true and never leaves our side. Isn't this what our kids are fearful of when they are little and going to school for the first time? Isn't this what we want our kids to remember when they are heading into high school or college and leaving home? Isn't this what we want our mom or dad to remember when hard choices are being made on a daily basis about the best care for them? Isn't remembering God's role in our lives and doing our best to respect those around us while honoring our loved ones with our faith our ultimate goal?

I believe one could make the connection with "The Kissing Hand" to Isaiah 41:10 - "Do not fear: I am with you; do not be anxious: I am your God. I will strengthen you, I will help you, I will uphold you with my victorious right hand."

Whatever journey you or your family find yourself on, always remember you are not alone. You are loved and will not be forsaken. God Bless.



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
