Corpus Christi **Procession Brings** Jesus to Pontiac

Evangelization and Youth Ministry Director Megan Lauritsen found herself towards the very back of the long procession ahead of her on Corpus Christi Sunday last month. She was taking it all in - the reverence, the size of the crowd, the singing, and the

Adam hoped that fifty people would attend. "That would be a good start," he commented, "and we can build on that for next year. I'd be happy with 50." He was wrong.



On the first day of a National Eucharistic Revival (lasting three years culminating with a convention in Indianapolis in 2024), Pontiac St. Mary's set a high standard for the Diocese of Peoria with a procession of nearly 250 people who paraded around the downtown square, sharing our faith with whoever happened to notice, even if it was just each other.

Four devotional altars were set up in front of business establishments and in the Block 59 parking lot. Singing eucharistic hymns along the way as the crowd meandered on their journey, reflections were read at each of the stops; adoration took place, and then the crowd headed to the next one for a repeat performance until the procession ended in the church with Benediction

People knelt on the streets. Others stood with heads bowed. Still others closed their eyes, looking skyward. Families walked together. Couples held hands. Golf carts hauled those who needed a ride. The Jolly Trolley carried others as well. Parents pushed their young in strollers. Bottles of water were shared. Prayers echoed around the square. Incense floated skyward.

People noticed. Cars stopped to see what was going on. Tourists did a double-take. "Who are these people?" The procession sometimes stretched the length of an entire block.

Four men carried a recently purchased canopy over Father Adam and the Monstrance hosting the Blessed Sacrament from stop to stop on a bright, sunny, yet a bit warm morning. Mick Lauritsen, Craig Cramer, Jeff Gray, and Chris Frauli did an amazing job in that capacity. And so did the numerous altar servers, led by Victor Johns III and seminarian Ryan Mann, as well as the Knights of Columbus Honor Guard and Acolyte Ray White.

Following the Benediction, the energy continued to flow throughout the church. Folks just didn't want to leave. A



TV podcast was on hand to interview Father and several others to share reactions to the day.

Megan explained that it was "a beautiful witness of tangible faith...(to) have such a public witness to your faith and say, 'Yes! This is what I believe'...is so incredible!" Spreading the Good News...that's what it's all about.

...the Catechesis of the Good Shepherd story?

CGS is a common religious experience involving children and adults in which the religious values of childhood, primarily those values of contemplation and enjoyment of God, are predominant. This experience is shared in a place particularly prepared for the religious life of children called the



Atrium. Its primary goal is "To involve adults and children in a religious experience in which the religious values of the child are predominant, keeping in mind that the contemplative nature of the child indicates to the adult a certain way of drawing near to God."

The CGS approach is extremely unique, yet rewarding. "We believe that God and the child have a unique relationship with one another, particularly before the age of six; that growth of this relationship should be assisted by the adult, but is directed by the Spirit of God; that children need their own place to foster the growth of that relationship; and that the child's spiritual growth is best served through tangible but indirect means. Our mission is to support catechists, parents, and others in the Church and beyond, as they grow in their understanding of the religious potential of children."

Our Catechesis of the Good Shepherd program is an integral, critical part of the spiritual development of our St. Mary's students. The students LOVE the program, and the adults working alongside LOVE what they are doing. To see how you can help, go to page 5.

quite absolute, final way.


What you are in love with,



From The Back Page

Many readers probably know that I often post a "Thought for the Day" on social media platforms quite regularly. Not that I'm an expert or anything, but when I come across an idea or a picture or a quote or an image that motivates my mind, I feel the need to share it, in hopes that other minds can be stimulated as well.

I came across this one earlier this month, and I couldn't get it posted soon enough. "Tweaking," by definition means *improving (a mechanism or system) by making fine adjustments to it.* We men are really good at this mode of operation. My dad loved to "tinker" or "experiment" out in the garage, always looking for an easier way to get things done. He passed that on to me. Ladies "tweak" as well. Mom oftentimes changed recipes in the kitchen to suit her needs and desires. There ALWAYS has to be an easier way, and in our every day lives, it's not necessarily a bad thing. But NOT in prayer!

I wish I had a dollar for every time I prayed to God for Him to fix things that would satisfy my wants. My wants, not my needs. My wants. What I want. That's what is most important. Not what's good for others or the situation, but what helps me, Mick Peterson, achieve my goal. Fix it God! I know you can! Make ME happy!

Well, Sherlock, Prayer doesn't work that way. As a child, I learned *THY will be done!* Not mine! His! But my stubbornness keeps preventing me

from seeing that light. God does not TWEAK...He TRANSFORMS. And that's a pretty big deal.

Transformation involves a thorough or dramatic change in form or appearance. As Father Adam has been stressing these last few months, What we form in our minds affects what goes on in our hearts, and what we feel in our hearts affects our performance or actions. God simply wants us to follow His lead, follow His way. Not by tweaking things along the way to make them easier, but by living the life we were meant to...and NEED to in order that we receive our heavenly reward.

It's not easy! We humans constantly look for that tweak to fit our schedules or agendas. I believe the hardest part of this principle is to accept the fact that It's not about ME! We love to create our own rules, our own exceptions....I went to a Wedding Mass on Saturday; I don't need to go on Sunday....We had fish last night; we don't need to go without meat on this Lenten Friday...Mass should only be 45 minutes long; we have a lot to do today...I don't need Confession; I just tell God I'm sorry myself.

I've used all these. They fit my agenda, so they made sense. I tweaked the rules to satisfy my schedule. I was in charge. I was in command. And then I learned a new definition of "tweaking."

Tweaking also means *twisting or pulling something sharply*, like an ear or nose. The nuns used to do that to us back in grade school. My grandma did it when I got sassy. And it's an idea that surely has crossed God's mind as I pray. A Holy Tweak! And I'd deserve it.

In order to become in the image and likeness of God, we can't look for shortcuts; we can't expect our agendas will be satisfied in prayer; we can't hope that God is going to tweak matters that we pray about. He's looking for that dramatic change in our approach to life, the kind that will lead us to heaven. Let's keep God in the "business" He's known for.
