

"GO OUT AND SPREAD THE GOOD NEWS"

Those were Jesus' words to the Apostles as he sent them out across the land to bring people to Christ. Our parishioners will have the opportunity to "Go Out and Spread the Good News" at our 2nd Annual Corpus Christi Procession to be held on Sunday, June 11, immediately after the 9:30 Mass. As Father Adam and the altar servers, process out of church with the Blessed Sacrament, everyone is invited to follow as we process around the downtown Pontiac courthouse square, approximately a half mile walk, stopping at 4 places to pray and meditate. While walking, we will sing hymns of praise led by Music Director Merryn Krenz. If you are unable to walk this distance, the trolley will be available to follow along.

After the procession returns to the church for benediction and a final blessing, everyone is invited to come over to the parish hall where we will have a Farewell Reception for Fr. Adam, as this will be his final weekend with us. For those not attending the Corpus Christi Procession, the Farewell Reception will be held from 12 noon to 2pm. Refreshments will be served by our Women's Guild.



Father Adam has said that this will be the best gift we can give him as he leaves, to attend the Corpus Christi Procession and be witnesses of our faith to our community.


From the Principal's Desk...

WELCOME FR. JOE

On Wednesday, June 14, we will welcome our new pastor, Fr. Joseph Baker (Fr. Joe) to St. Mary's. Fr. Joe was ordained in 2015 alongside Fr. Adam.

They were classmates in seminary. Fr. Joe comes to us from St. Ambrose in Milan and St. Patrick in Andalusia, near the Quad Cities. He also served as a chaplain at Central Catholic High School from 2017-20. Please introduce yourself to Fr. Joe when you see him.

This time of year is when all of the graduations occur. Of course each spring is preschool graduation where they wear their tiny little caps and gowns, sing songs, and move on to elementary school. They are taught by passionate people who know the value of early education. This is where they learn to use their words, play nicely, begin working in groups, and so on. My kids attended Noah's Ark where of course they also had lessons about God and Bible stories. These skills will prepare them for the rest of their educational lives and adult lives for that matter.

After preschool graduation, then you have kindergarten. Some schools have graduation ceremonies and some don't. This is an awesome time of year because the kids grow and change so much. They are beginning to read and turning into more social, dynamic individuals. This is not a time for the faint of heart. Their little brains are like sponges - they soak up everything good and bad sometimes.

Then comes elementary school and junior high. Man do these years fly by. The kids continue to grow and learn academically, socially, emotionally, and if they are lucky enough to go to SMS, they grow spiritually. They are pushed and challenged to learn new skills and concepts, while learning to process that knowledge and connect it to what is taught at home and how to apply it to real world issues. Faith is a big part of this also.

Of course high school graduation and maybe college for some is next and it is such a fast paced 4 years. With technology like it is today, the majority of students are never not engaged socially. They are never off. I think each generation thinks they had it pretty tough, but I have to say kids today are exposed to so much more than I remember being exposed to. Times have changed, and people often change with it. However, this is where the learning should continue especially in regards to our relationship with Jesus. .

Learning about our faith and religion should keep going. It should not just stop because you are no longer in elementary school or high school. Adults continue to grow and evolve as time goes by. For some people it takes them longer to realize what they need or what is lacking in their life. Father Adam always says when you put Jesus first things tend to fall in place or at least are more manageable. When we put our own needs, wants, and desires ahead of Jesus and others, there is a ripple effect. It throws our society out of whack. His "JOY" acronym is something he used to appeal to the kids, but it also appeals to us older kids. When you take the time to think about it, putting Jesus first is never a bad thing, ever. Serving others and then yourself. Imagine if everyone practiced this simple 3 letter concept, how much better our world would be for our kids. I hope you all are able to practice JOY this summer and never lose that desire to keep learning.

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
