### Spreading the Good News Around St. Mary's Parish



### Did You Know-

### HOW DID ALL SOULS' DAY GET STARTED?

To understand the origins of All Souls' Day, we should probably start with All Saints' Day. During the Middle Ages, most Christian communities held a yearly feast to honor the Church's saints—martyrs who had died and gone to heaven. In time, this day

came to be known as All Saints' Day, and the Catholic Church made it a holy day of obligation.

Sometime in the 10th century, the Catholic priest St. Odilo of Cluny instituted All Souls' Day—a day to pray for the souls of deceased family members—ordinary men and women who had



lived good lives and were waiting in purgatory until they were worthy to enter heaven.

When it comes to All Souls' Day, people of faith around the world hold extraordinary beliefs and traditions about spirits on this day: According to Hungarian tradition, all work and housework is forbidden on All Souls' Day. It is seen as disrespectful to the dead, and it is believed that any work done will be sabotaged by them. According to a superstition from the Philippines: When it rains on All Souls' Day, the raindrops are tears of the dead. According to the teachings of the Catholic Church, Catholics can shorten the time a soul spends in purgatory by visiting a church and praying the Our Father and the Creed on All Souls' Day. In the Mexican culture, All Souls' Day is known as Día de los Muertos or the Day of the Dead. It is believed that the dead are still members of the community, kept alive in memory and spirit, and during the Day of the Dead, they temporarily return to Earth.

### NEW ALTAR AT ST. MARY'S CEMETERY







Informal discussions had been held in years past regarding the installation of a permanent altar at our cemetery, but had not moved beyond that stage. Following the 2021 Memorial Day Mass at the cemetery, given the great response to this Mass, discussions resumed. It was determined that this project was not only feasible, but could prove to be a great benefit to the parish. Father Adam and some members of the cemetery board held several meetings with Mark Ifft of Pontiac Granite, with several designs being discussed. The altar, and a matching ambo (lectern) was ordered last winter in the hopes it would be delivered and installed by Memorial Day, 2022. Due to supply chain issues, and difficulties locating a piece of granite meeting the quality standards and size of our specifications, this was not go be. Ron Schulz and Jack Timmerman did a great job of pouring the concrete pad to accommodate the new altar and ambo. The altar ultimately arrived, and was installed on October 6, 2022 on a beautiful fall morning.

An All Souls Day Mass will be held at 12 noon on Wednesday, November 2 at the cemetery to honor all the dead buried there. Bring your lawn chairs. The traditional evening All Souls Memorial Mass being held in church will have names read and candles lit in memory of those who passed away this last year. It is hoped this new addition to our cemetery can be used several times during the year during nice weather.

Why: To build community, to grow in our love for Jesus, and to help us all get to heaven.


**Where:** Participants will be notified once sign ups are completed and meeting locations are determined.

Webster's Dictionary defines the word team as "a group of people who work together." I truly believe that everyone should be on a team of some sort in their lifetime. I think a team can be any group, whether it be musically, athletically, academically, occupationally, anything with a shared goal. The lessons learned and the value of being on a team are immeasurable.

I have been involved in some sort of team or group since I was a child and now continue to be involved in various teams as an adult through my job and church. The first value of being on a team is there is power in numbers. One person can be persuasive; two or more people can be divine. A reflection I read about a recent Gospel mentioned how it was no accident that Jesus sent his Apostles in twos. The idea was people would see how the Apostles interacted with each other and spoke about Christ that they would be intrigued and want to learn more. There was power in the number.

Strength is increased when working together for a common goal. One team member may be a poor speaker or communicator. Another may have suffered great loss or tragedy and is unsure. Yet another may be boisterous and well meaning but misunderstood. If and when one member of

your team falls, it is the other members who will lift them up. Working on a common goal allows these individuals to lean on each other and continue to grow in strength. The insight gained from other members strengths and weaknesses is also great.

Two or more people believing in something and sharing it with others also shows trust. Look at any sports team when they are celebrating a huge win or when they have played their final game together. The trust it takes to give 100% and share the joy and agony. The idea of working as disciples on a mission to bring more followers to Christ requires us to trust God, trust our priests, trust the people in charge of leading us. The Apostles gained people's trust in the same way. The Apostles had each other for support and companionship. "For where two or three gather in my name, there am I with them." (Matthew 18:20)

A fourth quality gained by being on a team is the reward. Of course our reward is Heaven, and the team we are on is as followers of Christ. The gift of sharing a common goal or desire, the gift of sacrificing one's self to lend a helping hand to a neighbor or friend, the work put into growing a relationship with another person, these are rewarding. I listened to Father Adam's homily recently about our mission, and he spoke about all of the good things that have been accomplished the past few years despite the pandemic and trials we are currently facing. So many great rewards being heaped upon us all. We can truly count ourselves as blessed.

I would encourage everyone to be a good teammate. Learn to celebrate the power, trust, strength and reward that comes from working with others in our goal towards Heaven.
