FROM THE PASTOR'S DESK



Eternal Rest Grant Unto Them, O Lord, and May Perpetual Light Shine Upon Them

If you are at all like me, you can probably hardly believe we are already on the cusp of November. Each year these days in the calendar leave me a little exasperated. The summer is certainly gone. The days are shorter.

Most of the corn and beans have been cut. It leaves me thinking that the Church has some wisdom in asking us to set aside the month of November to reflect on eternity and specifically to pray for the Faithful Departed, the Church Suffering, those who are going through the final stages of purgation before entering the glory of Heaven.

Indeed, this is what the Church asks us to do in November, and it is fitting. The natural world is approaching its annual "death". Soon, all the lush signs of summer life and produce will be gone and we will enter into the cold, dark, and short days of winter. As Christians, though, we know so often what appears to be reality is not actually the case. Yes, the world seems to die, but agroscience tells us the freezing, the thawing, the snow, the ice, the melting, the refreezing, and the re-melting serves a purpose. It is this process that prepares the ground for the beautiful spring and summer that will once again be upon us in 2024. The death of late fall and winter paves the way for life to come.

So in November we remember those who have died, those who have died in this past year especially, but all those who have died over the ages, our family members, our loves ones, our friends, those who perhaps were once so close to us but of whom we have not so much as given a thought in many years. Each year we are encouraged to call all these people to mind, as many as we possibly can, and pray for them.

I recommend in the coming days to spend 30 minutes writing down the names of each person who meant something to you who is deceased...for that matter, write down the name of each person you can remember who is deceased, even those who did not mean anything to you. Write down the names of those whom you wished you had not remembered. Maybe the fact that you have recalled their name is an indication they are pleading with you to pray for them. There are so many forgotten souls in Purgatory, and they too need our prayers, especially in this month of November. If you take me up on this exercise, I think you will find when the 30 minutes are completed, something powerful, something indescribable has happened in your own soul.

Bring your list of names to St. Mary's and write them in our Book of the Dead which will be to

the side of the ambo for the entire month. These names will be especially remembered at each of our Masses throughout the month. Visit a cemetery and pray for the dead laid in that place. The Church offers a plenary indulgence to anyone who does so between November 1 and November 8, presuming the individual also prays for the needs of the Pope and goes to Confession within a week of visiting the cemetery.

Of special note, I encourage you to attend our Masses on November 1 and November 2. November 1, of course, is All Saint's Day, a Holy Day of Obligation. We will have Masses that day at 7am (note the difference from the 6am Mass that we have had in the past on Holy Days), 8:15am school Mass, and 5:30pm. We will also have a Vigil Mass for the Holy Day on the evening of October 31 at 5:30pm.

The next day, November 2, is All Soul's Day, the one day throughout the year which is reserved specifically to pray for the dead. On this day, each priest is encouraged to say three separate Masses in which one can be said for a specific intention, one is offered for the Pope, and one is offered for all the Faithful Departed. As in previous years, prior to the beginning of our evening Mass, we will have a service in which we will read the names and honor those who have died over the last calendar year. We will also have a Mass at 7am in the church and a Mass at noon at St. Mary's cemetery (weather permitting), after which I will lead those who would like to stay in reciting the Rosary.

Finally on the evening of Thursday, November 9, I invite you to attend a viewing of a 75 minute film, "Purgatory: The Forgotten Church' at 6:30pm. Following the film, we will have a question and answer/sharing session for anyone who would like to stick around. This 2013 film produced by a friar of the St. Bonaventure Province of Conventual Franciscans in Chicago is extremely well done, is captivating throughout, and is the best source I have seen that explains and makes sense of Purgatory. If you have questions about Purgatory or what happens after death, I bet this film will aid you in beginning to find an answer.

So as I began, I end: I can hardly believe we are nearly in the 11th month of 2023. Yes, God's created world is approaching its annual "death" but like our own deaths, we know it is not really the end. As the famed prayer of St. Francis of Assisi concludes, "It is in dying that we are born to eternal life." When the cold of winter has passed, the world will come back to life. May we spend this coming month praying for the departed who have passed, that they would enter into eternal life and that one day we, too, will be there with them, and with a nod to the even more distant future, may you have a Blessed Advent and a Happy 2024!

Have you ever asked the Holy Spirit to help you participate in the Mass more deeply?? I don't just mean the outward things like singing, vocal-

izing the prayers of the Mass that are said by the congregation instead of remaining silent, but actually asking Our Lord to help you to bring your heart into the participation of the Mass. Just like any relationship if you stop participating with an open heart and learning more about one another, that relationship becomes stale and boring. So maybe next time you go to Mass, ask the Holy Spirit to help you to participate more in the Holy Sacrifice of the Mass and watch what happens overtime.



Heavenly Father, you have sown the seeds of faith in your people and given us the responsibility as the Church to nurture and grow an abundant harvest for the Kingdom of God.



Pontiac Planning Area




Grouping – Merger of the following parishes:



From The Back Page

Dear St. Mary's Parishioners,

This article is being written like a letter to family and friends since you are like family and many of you are friends. The big difference is that I commonly write letters to one person at a time, and you are a sizable group with a variety of gifts, tastes, ideas, and preferences. I like that about you! You keep my attention and me on my toes! So, how have you been? I hope you are happy and joyful, but not too comfortable. Too much comfort tends to make me think I deserve it—which I don't. Too much comfort helps me forget about getting ready for Heaven. Come, Lord Jesus, save me from my comfort zone!

Kel Krenz and I facilitated the first group of our Evangelical Catholic Reach More Mission Training at St. Mary's. Kel has moved on to teach at Central Catholic and I am currently shepherding our ten newly trained leaders as they lead evangelizing small groups in our community. I am also preparing to launch two new training groups in the spring.

The Evangelical Catholic is a nation-wide promoter of our faith, offering formation and training for lay people to engage in their personal apostolates. Over the course of twelve weeks, parishioners are formed and trained to build relationships and share the good news with people in their lives who have fallen away from the Church or are not Catholic. We have ten newly-trained leaders from our parish ready to invite people who are not Catholic or who are not currently active at St. Mary's into their small group bible studies.

"What happens in these small groups?" you may well ask. These groups gather around God's Word to share in fellowship, spiritual growth, and prayer, all within the context of friendship and trust. Our hope is that genuine friendship, mentorship, and prayerful reflection on scripture will encourage members of the small group to reunite with or join the Church.

What we are doing through the help of Evangelical Catholic, is an apostolic movement, which is not the same as a ministry. Ministries serve those already in Holy Church. Personal apostolates, however, go out into the world to welcome home those who seek the fullness of faith, that is, the Catholic Church.

Since October is dedicated to the Holy Rosary of the Blessed Virgin Mary, it may be a good time to reconsider how often you and/or your family honor Mary and Jesus by praying the Rosary. If ever there was a time to reflect on what the Holy Eucharist means to each of us, it is now, during this three year revival of the Blessed Sacrament. As one of the saints said, some people may not believe in the power of the Eucharist because it seems too good to be true. But it's both true and very good!!

Please pray for our evangelical efforts as we strive to obey Jesus' commission to go and make disciples. If you have questions, please ask me. Lastly, please remember the homebound and those in nursing care. They evangelize us if we let them. God bless you!
